Dear friends,

Finally, the days are getting longer, the evenings lighter. Spring seems just around the corner – personally, I can't wait; I've had enough of the cold and dark and grey days. To help Spring along, I have already been sowing some flower seeds. It's early yet, but some of them will need quite a bit of time and pampering before they are ready to be put in the garden beds. For me, there are few things as hopeful as seeds – those tiny little globes, some hardly visible to the eye, with so much potential in them: to grow into vegetables and flowers and trees, even. What they carry is no guarantee, it is potential – there is no certainty that they will grow. In order to do so, they'll need what Jesus already lists in one of his parables: fertile soil, otherwise their potential might never come to flourish. They'll also need sunshine and warmth and rain and nourishment; some will need more nurturing than others in order to grow.

In our lives, we can also grow seeds in a different sense: we can plant seeds of inspiration, of hope, of kindness. In the ways we live our lives, in the ways we relate to others, we can choose to be critical, careless, cynical, overly cautious – or we can choose to be encouraging, constructive, positive and hopeful. Looking at the world around us, there is much to worry about – but we have the potential to make changes to the little patch of the world that surrounds us, through the choices we make. Every smile, every encouraging word, every kind gesture can seem like very little to us, but could be the seed of hope that someone needs right at that moment. Every choice we make for good: in how we live our lives, in how we relate to other people and our surroundings, can sow a seed for positive change. Those seeds need nurturing, too – they might be nourished through encouragement, through the companionship of others going a similar way with us, through the hope that our faith can offer us in our trust in God.

Flowers release their seeds at the completion of their lives; the seeds then disappear in the dark soil, and only then can they realise their potential to release new plants, new life. As we move into the time of Lent, we remember that Jesus had to die before he could rise to new life, before he could offer us a chance for new life, for new beginnings, too. In our lives, God invites us to become co-creators: not only of our gardens, but of kindness, love and peace in the world.

## Gift Aid

6th April 2019 – probably not the first date that comes to mind in this year, but it is a notable day in the life of a Chancellor of the Exchequer, being the first day of the new tax year. Now that same Chancellor has money to give to the church, and it is in the form of Gift Aid. True to say that the money came from tax payers in the first place, so we may as well quite legitimately have some of it back.

I would like to call 6th April - GA Day, because gift aid is such an important element in the overall income of our churches. During 2018 the total gift aid claimed on weekly giving amounted to £8,215, a substantial portion of our total income. What my spreadsheets show (see what I did there) is a trend of falling claims over the years, note that in 2017 we received £9,489.

Our cash reserves that fund the day to day expenditure have also been falling and I would like to ask if there are any givers who do pay tax and currently donate weekly into the “open plate” at our church services. Will you consider taking up Free Will Offering envelopes or a regular Standing Order and sign up to Gift Aid via a simple declaration form. It will add 25% to the value of your own giving, and help to boost the gift aid income from the “open plate”.

To explain that last comment about the “open plate”, part of the money we claim comes under the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme. That scheme allows us to claim gift aid on “open plate” giving, and other small donations, of up to a total of £8,000 in a tax year. This gives us up to £2,000 in gift aid. We are now at the point where the “open plate” giving is exceeding £8,000 in a tax year, which means that we cannot claim on the amount above £8,000. We will probably not be able to claim for £300 of gift aid this year.

If we can divert some giving from the “open plate” into Free Will Offering envelopes/Standing Order then we will automatically increase our overall gift aid income from the same amount of giving.

## General Assembly

The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland takes place in Edinburgh from Saturday 18 until Friday 24 May. Commissioners to the General Assembly are appointed on a rota basis, and this year is our turn to be represented. Anikó will therefore attend as a Commissioner along with one of our Elders. Volunteers are also being sought to assist with the stewarding throughout the week, as well as to help serve teas and coffees. The only requirement for stewarding is a moderate level of fitness (for standing and escorting people up and down stairs). Please let us know if you would like to offer your services as a Steward this year.

## Saltoun War Memorial

To mark the recent centenary of the First World War armistice, Rhona Wilson, a resident of East Saltoun, has researched the lives of those residents of Saltoun parish who died in the conflict and whose names are read out each year on Remembrance Sunday in Saltoun or Bolton. The research commemorates them and gives an insight into their lives – where they lived and worked, as well as information about their families. The booklet also provides details about the war memorial window and its inauguration in 1921 (in the Fletcher Aisle). Rhona’s researches include the details of a further two men who for some reason are not listed among the War Dead from WW1 on the brass plaque below the memorial window but whose names are included in the list of names read out on each Remembrance Sunday.

A copy of this latest research can be viewed inside Saltoun Kirk, near the War Memorial. Copies of the Saltoun War Memorial booklet are also available at The Bothy, our local shop in the village (where copies can also be bought of A History of Saltoun and the Fletcher Family). Both publications provide a fascinating insight into the lives of previous generations in the Saltoun area.
